CURB APPEAL DO'S

DO: MAKE SIDING THE STAR

Siding is arguably the most important feature of a home's exterior design, making or breaking a first impression. Show personality by mixing and matching siding materials when building or remodeling to be the neighborhood standout.





DO: CREATE A FRONT PORCH FOCAL POINT

The front door is the focal point of a home's exterior design, and is a good indicator of what's inside. Take an unexpected color risk (like a bright pop or contrasting dark hue) with the front door to create an eye-catching focus.

DO: LET THERE BE LIGHT

Properly installed, interesting lighting not only adds drama to home design by illuminating its best features, but incorporates a layer of safety and security. Make sure you light the way, installing fixtures along the front porch, walkway and significant landscape features.





DO: (REALISTICALLY) INVEST IN LANDSCAPING

Landscaping goes a long way in creating an attractive street front view, but be realistic. Elaborate designs may catch your attention at first, but high-maintenance landscaping can be impossible to manage long-term.

CURB APPEAL DON'TS

DON'T: OVERLOOK THE BASICS

Who said keeping up with exterior design has to be time-consuming and pricey? Think simple—fix shutters, ensure the landscape is up-to-par and make sure the basic exterior elements of the home complement one another.







DON'T: VEER TOO MUCH FROM NEIGHBORING COMPLEX AESTHETICS

While you want to make sure homes stand out from the others, going too far in the other direction could leave people scratching their heads. Don't get too carried away with an exterior design that isn't harmonious with the overall neighborhood style.
